Public Hearing

HLC#19-010: Public Hearing to consider a request for a Historic Landmark Overlay District designation for the Patterson-Rydell House located at 202 W. Oak Street

Chairman Smith opened the public hearing and called for anyone wishing to speak to come forward.

Faye Rydell, the applicant, gave an overview of the request and was available to answer questions. Bill Beard spoke in support of the request.

Subject: HLC#20-001: Public hearing to consider a request for a Historic Landmark Overlay District designation for the Ralph S. Man Homestead located at 604 W. Broad Street; City of Mansfield, owner

COMMENTS AND CONSIDERATIONS

The City is initiating the process for a Historic Landmark Overlay District classification for the Ralph S. Man Homestead at 604 W. Broad Street. This designation will allow the Commission to review future exterior alterations to the structure and protect the property's historic significance.

Approximately 1.433 acres has been set aside for the Homestead. The remaining property belongs to the adjacent City dog park and will be outside of the Historic Overlay District boundary. The property is currently zoned PR and will be used as a museum and education center.

The City purchased the property in 2013, including the Man House, the historic barn and other structures, for a public park. The house was initially constructed by Ralph Sandiford Man, one of the City's founders. As the oldest documented house in Mansfield, and the residence of a person of great importance in the City's history, the R.S. Man House has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Additionally, the Man House is listed as a high priority on the City's Historic Resources Survey.

Due to its importance, the City Council directed that the house be preserved and that restoration efforts be made with a view of converting the house and the original log barn into a museum and education center. The house and original barn are currently undergoing the permit review process for the restoration. Man Homestead will offer visitors an opportunity to learn about early life in Mansfield, from Ralph Man's original log cabin inside the house to the original barn, which was constructed in the fashion of the time.

TMA-CHA Architects and Phoenix 1 Restoration and Construction have developed plans to restore the house to its 1930s appearance. The severely damaged 1946 shed and the 1970s garage and carport, which are non-contributing additions, will be removed. The 1865 wood barn will also be restored. The plan also includes the relocation of two log cabins, one owned by the City and one by the Mansfield Historical Society, to the property.

Historic Details:

The *Mansfield Resources Survey Update, 1998*, lists the Ralph S. Man Homestead as a High priority. The property is described in the National Register nomination as follows:

Built between ca. 1865 and ca. 1868, the Ralph Sandiford and Julia Boisseau Man House incorporates a one-room log house into its present l½-story wood and brick

form. The house is a good local example of an early dwelling enlarged and remodeled from a frontier cabin into a comfortable upper middle-class residence. Located at the west end of the original town of Mansfield, just outside the original town plat, the house is Mansfield's oldest known surviving building and was constructed by Ralph Sandiford Man, one Mansfield's founders, for himself, his wife Julia and their two children; subsequent interior remodeling and expansions were made between 1870 and the 1930s. The 1¹/₂-story wood and brick dwelling faces south onto West Broad Street and is about six blocks west of the historic commercial district of Mansfield. The house incorporates a symmetrical facade with a cross gabled roof pierced by dormer windows on the front facade. A centrally placed entry sheltered by a flat roof porch features a glass and wood door, set within a Greek Revival influenced surround with fixed pane side lights and transom. At the northwest corner (rear) is a ca. 1930 one-story shed roof section containing the service porch and bathroom. A four space garage/carport added in 1974 is at the northeast (rear) of the house; neither of the rear additions are visible from the street.

Designation Considerations:

The Historic Landmark Overlay District designation should be considered in light of the following:

1. Recognition as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, a National Historic Landmark, or entered into the National Register of Historic Places.

The house was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in May, 2003.

2. Embodiment of distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type or specimen.

The Ralph and Julia Man House is an unusual example of a vernacular central hall plan house type in Mansfield. The house also conveys understanding of how Mansfield changed from a frontier settlement to a prosperous farm service community and how the needs of a growing family fostered conversion of a one-room cabin into a substantial middle-class residence. The house also relates the lifestyle and relative wealth and social standing of Ralph Man, and is the only surviving resource associated with Man. The house is worthy of preservation as a local landmark that through its residential function and long association with the Man family documents development patterns in Mansfield and provides interpretation of local social and architectural trends between ca. 1865 and 1906.

3. Identification with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the culture or development of the City.

Ralph Sandiford Man (1825-1906), a South Carolina native who came to Texas in the 1850s, was one of the founders of Mansfield. The town was named for Man and his brother-in-law and business partner Julian Feild. The two men operated a steam-powered grist mill that

supplied grain to the Confederacy during the Civil War (1861-1865) and later to U.S. troops at Fort Belknap and Fort Griffin.

Man Homestead Master Plan:

The property is subject to the Man House Master Plan approved by the City Council. The master plan includes the following:

- 1. Restoration of the Man House and the 1865 barn with crushed granite walkways meeting ADA standards;
- 2. Relocation of historic log cabins to the Homestead, with space for other historic structures as approved by the Museum;
- 3. A visitor center and restrooms to be located in the public park adjacent to the Homestead boundary. These structures will not be part of the Historic Landmark Overlay District;
- 4. An amphitheater designed to blend with the terrain between the house and the barn;
- 5. Removal of the 1946 shed; and
- 6. Removal of the 1970s garage and carport.

Staff recommends approval of the Historic Landmark Overlay District in accordance with the approved Man Homestead Master Plan.










SCOPE OF PROTECTION

IT IS THE SPECIFIC INTENT OF THESE DOCUMENTS THAT ALL ORIGINAL STRUCTURES, SURFACES, FINISHES, HARDWARE AND EQUIPMENT BE PROTECTED FROM DAMAGE AND VANDALISM DURING DEMOLITION, AND DURING CONSTRUCTION.



Section 5400

- **D. Landmark Designation Criteria:** In making such designations as set forth in paragraph C above, the City Council shall consider, but shall not be limited to, one or more of the following criteria:
 - a. Character, interest or value as part of the development, heritage or cultural characteristics of the City of Mansfield, State of Texas, or the United States.
 - b. Recognition as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, a National Historic Landmark, or entered into the National Register of Historic Places.
 - c. Appear to be eligible for the National Register and also may be eligible for designation as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark as indicated in the 1983 Tarrant County Historic Resource Survey; included as an authoritative reference for this purpose.
 - d. Embodiment of distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type or specimen.
 - e. Identification as the work of an architect or master builder whose individual work has influenced the development of the City.
 - f. Embodiment of elements of architectural design, detail, materials or craftsmanship which represent a significant architectural innovation.
 - g. Relationship to other distinctive buildings, sites or areas which are eligible for preservation as described in Section 8700, Paragraph E, "Powers and Duties", based on architectural, historic or cultural motif.
 - h. Portrayal of the environment of a group of people in an area of history characterized by a distinctive architectural style.
 - i. Archaeological value in that it has produced or can be expected to produce data affecting theories of historic or prehistoric interest.
 - j. Exemplification of the cultural, economic, social, ethnic, or historical heritage of the City, State, or United States.
 - k. Location as a site of a significant historic event.
 - 1. Identification with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the culture or development of the City, County, State or Nation.
 - m. A building, structure, or place that because of its location has become of historic or cultural value to a neighborhood or community.

Subject: HLC#20-002: Discussion and possible action regarding potential landmark status for the old Mansfield High School and Rock Gym located at 605 E. Broad Street

COMMENTS AND CONSIDERATIONS

The Mansfield Independent School District (MISD) owns two public buildings that are important to the City's history at 605 E. Broad Street: the old Mansfield High School (1924) and the Old Rock Gym (1940). These former educational facilities are now part of MISD's administration complex.

Staff is seeking the Commission's consent to invite MISD to designate the old High School and the Old Rock Gym as Mansfield historic landmarks. Normally, the Historic Landmark Overlay District would apply to the entire property. In this case, Staff recommends that only the two buildings be included in the Overlay District to avoid disrupting any future plans for the development of the administration complex.

These buildings are listed in the *Historic Resources Survey Update, 1998*, as Selected Medium priorities. Selected Medium priority resources have less architectural and physical integrity and possibly less historic significance than properties in the High classification, but they are unusual property types or architectural styles, use unusual construction methods, or for some other reason indicate a potentially significant history in relation to development patterns.

The buildings are described in the Tarrant County Historic Resources Survey, 1983, as follows:

Old Mansfield High School, 1924


Schools have stood on this site continuously since 1867, when the Mansfield Male and Female College, one of the first co-educational institutions in Texas, was founded by Dr. John C. Collier. In 1873, the land was deeded by Julian Feild to Dr. Collier "...for school purposes [forever]...." The Mansfield Academy, which opened in 1901, was housed in a substantial two-story red-brick structure on this site. With the creation of the Mansfield Independent School District in 1909, the Academy building was purchased to house Mansfield's public school. In 1924, bonds were sold for construction of Mansfield High School. Designed by W.G. Clarkson & Co. of Fort Worth, and built by James T. Taylor, it housed Mansfield's high school until 1963.

Old Mansfield High School Gymnasium ''Old Rock Gym'', 1940

Built as the gym for the old Mansfield High School, this 1940 structure is the only known building constructed by the W.P.A. in the Mansfield area. The attractive ochre sandstone came from Bisbee. The workmanship - by Luke Lynn, Bethel "Slim" Murray, Owen Metcalf and Ed Nelson - is excellent.

Subject: HLC#19-011: Consideration of Possible Changes to the City's Historic Markers

COMMENTS AND CONSIDERATIONS

This item was tabled from the Commission's December 12, 2019, meeting. We received estimates from the Award Center for two options the Commission selected to review.

1. An aluminum medallion 12 inches in diameter. Aluminum must be cast and/or mechanically etched which produces less detail on the image. Aluminum will also be slightly thicker with more weight.

According to the Award Center, the bids for the aluminum medallions are over \$750.

2. An outdoor plastic resin medallion 12 inches in diameter. The resin option will provide the same detail as zinc with a considerable reduction in weight, thickness and cost. It can be given the same appearance as the standard markers, raised silver text and image with a black background. Using an outdoor material, this marker will last for years, but not as long as a metal marker.

This option would cost approximately \$558 per medallion.

Because of the high costs, the City does not have the funding to order a sample of each medallion for the Commission to see. Staff has contacted the Certified Local Government network to see what other cities use for their markers. We received a response from Waxahachie. Their markers are satin silver anodized aluminum plaques, but are thin and light weight. Staff has contacted Waxahachie's supplier to see if they are able to replicate the current marker design in aluminum.
